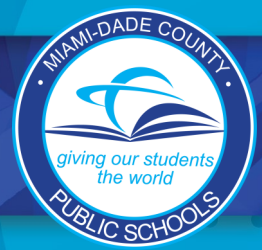
I hope to help my students gain the courage to speak up for themselves and be the most confident they can be because it will show in their work.
