## Celebrating Black History Month

Our nation celebrates **Black History Month** 2023 and its theme of **Black Resistance** with a special focus on prominent figures that “have sought ways to nurture and protect Black lives through resistance, nonviolence, education, literature, media, and legislation/politics.”

For generations, Miamians have honored such leaders with the founding of new public schools and renaming existing schools in which they have helped foster lasting contributions. With more than 100 years of diversification and rising above keystone challenges, M-DCPS remembers figures of **Black Resistance** for whom many of our schools are named.



### Phillis Wheatley

An active poet throughout her enslavement, Wheatley was able to touch the hearts of the enslaved, the free, and slaveholders alike, including our nation’s founding fathers. Through her poetry, she brought awareness to the infinite potential of Black people in America.



### Frederick Douglass

Douglass was a living counterexample to slaveholders’ belief that Black Americans lacked the intellectual capacity to function as independent citizens. Once free, his influential writings directly contributed to Abolition, and he was even nominated for the US Vice Presidency.



### Zora Neale Hurston

A central figure of the Harlem Renaissance, Hurston’s work brought awareness to social equality and integration during a critical time in history, allowing for brighter ideas to be born and for the fire of change to take form, bringing forth a future of unification.



## M-DCPS Women in Sports

Participation in sports and athletics provides psychological, physiological, and sociological benefits to all genders and ages. While girls and women athletes are least represented, they are the ones who often benefit the most from team play and an active lifestyle. Founded in 1974 by Billie Jean King, the Women's Sports Foundation reports that girls who play sports are more likely to have better grades, higher levels of confidence and self-esteem, a more positive body image, and lower levels of depression than girls who do not play sports.

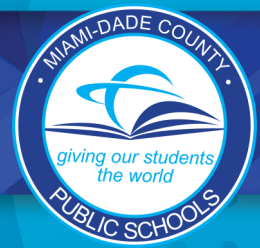
