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### The Young Prep at Choice Schools

Miami-Dade County Public Schools' innovation in education has made us a leader in Choice programs for decades, and we continue to develop and implement cutting-edge models for delivery of curriculum. Two such unique models can be found at secondary schools nestled in the heart of Miami – Young Men's Preparatory Academy (YMPA) and Young Women's Preparatory Academy (YWPA).



Founded in 2008, YMPA is a trailblazing single-gender M-DCPS

Magnet School that instills four essential competencies in their students: Scholarship, Leadership, Integrity, and Character. Having received a well-rounded education and continuing to grow into well-rounded individuals, all graduates leave YMPA with at least one college letter of acceptance.

Also serving a single-gender student body, YWPA has provided young ladies the unique opportunity to pursue challenging academic coursework in a unique instructional environment. There, since 2006, faculty and staff have been committed to providing students with a quality education based on academic

rigor and support. Thanks to their efforts, YWPA has been recognized as a Magnet Schools of America "Magnet School of Excellence"; by U.S. News & World Report as among the "Best 100 Schools in the Nation"; and for

achieving high female representation in computer science with the AP College Board's "Female Diversity Award in Computer Science Principles."



For the past 50 years, Miami-Dade County Public Schools has offered a wide variety of Magnet and Non-Magnet Choice schools/programs that allow students to explore a specific area of interest and grow to their fullest potential starting as young as four years old.
